The Brigmore Witches: A Reckoning

Having tracked down the key to saving the Empress's daughter, Emily Kaldwin, Daud must now infiltrate the domain of Delilah Copperspoon—a powerful witch who would later become the main antagonist in **Dishonored 2**. The setting of Brigmore Manor is a masterpiece of level design, blending Victorian decay with occult horror. Chaos vs. High Chaos
