### 4. Look for the Social

**Commentary:** Don't just read it as a love story. Ask yourself: Who represents the colonizer? Who is the oppressed? What is the message about justice?

The themes present in **Francisco Balagtas tula**—love, betrayal, oppression, justice, and hope—are timeless.
