Joseph ends up in Egypt, where he serves Potiphar. He resists the advances of Mrs. Potiphar, leading to her false accusations and his imprisonment. In jail, he interprets the dreams of the butler and the baker (the upbeat "Those Were the Good Old Days" from the baker, and the poignant "Close Every Door to Me" from Joseph). Two years

later, Pharaoh has disturbing dreams that none of his advisors can interpret. The butler remembers Joseph, who is summoned from prison. Joseph interprets Pharaoh's dreams of seven fat cows eaten by seven lean cows, and seven healthy ears of grain devoured by thin ears, as a prophecy of seven years of plenty followed by seven years of famine. Pharaoh is so impressed that he elevates Joseph to his second-in-command, tasking him with storing grain. The show's most famous song, "Any Dream Will Do," bookends the film. Later, during the famine, Joseph's brothers come to Egypt seeking food. They do not recognize him.

Joseph tests them by hiding a silver cup in Benjamin's sack. When Judah pleads for Benjamin's freedom, Joseph reveals his identity in the powerful "Who's the Thief?" sequence, leading to a joyful family reunion where "Give Me My Coat" marks the restoration of all relationships.

Iconic Musical Numbers That Define the Film

What makes the **Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor**

Dreamcoat full movie so memorable is its score, performed brilliantly by the cast. Each song seems to have its own distinct style and purpose.

- **"Any Dream Will Do"** – This is the show's signature song. Sung by Joseph at the beginning and reprised at the end, it speaks to the power of hope and dreams. Donny Osmond's soaring rendition became a hit single and perfectly captures the innocent optimism of the character.

- **“Benjamin Calypso”** – A fun calypso number sung by the brothers when they return with Benjamin. It adds a tropical flavor and showcases the ensemble’s energy.
- **“Those Canaan Days”** – A tongue-in-cheek lament by the brothers, performed in

mock French chanson style, complete with berets and a striped shirt. It's pure, joyful silliness.
