- **The Worm Line:** This is the lowest line, placed below the grass line. It is used for letters with descenders, such as "g," "j," "p," "q," and "y." The descending part of the letter goes down into the worm line, as if a worm is wiggling underground.

This systematic naming convention is brilliant in its simplicity. Instead of abstract spatial instructions, a teacher can say, "Start your 'b' at the sky line, go down to the grass line, and then come back up to the plane line." Young children can visualize and execute this instruction with far greater ease than they could with terms like "ascender" or "descender."

### WHY FOUNDATIONS PAPER IS DIFFERENT FROM STANDARD PRIMARY PAPER

Many parents and early childhood educators are familiar with the traditional three-line handwriting paper that features a dotted midline. While that paper serves a purpose, **Fundations Paper Kindergarten** offers several distinct advantages.

# Differentiate with Line Adaptations

Some students will need additional support. For those who struggle with fine motor control, consider highlighting the grass line or worm line in a specific color. ## Challenge: Descenders Not Reaching the Worm Line

Young writers sometimes stop their descenders too high, leaving them suspended between the grass line and worm line. Remind them that the worm line is like a basement for the letter tail. Draw a little worm or underground animal on the worm line as a fun visual cue.

## Challenge: Inconsistent Letter Size

Capital letters should touch the sky line and the grass line, while most lowercase letters should fit between the plane line and

grass line. If a child is making all letters the same size, use a highlighter to mark the correct vertical boundaries for each type of letter. Practice sorting letters into "tall," "short," and "underground" categories.

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### THE BIGGER PICTURE: HOW FOUNDATIONS PAPER SUPPORTS LONG-TERM WRITING SUCCESS
