Combining the story with targeted questions allows educators to teach a mini-lesson on elections. Students can discuss the function of delegates, the importance of a speech, and the value of a debate, turning a fictional story into a lesson in civic engagement.

CATEGORIZED GRACE FOR PRESIDENT COMPREHENSION QUESTIONS

To make the most of this resource, we have divided the questions

into three main categories: Literal, Inferential, and Evaluative. This structure allows you to guide students from simple recall to higher-order thinking.

Literal Comprehension Questions (The "Right There" Answers)

These questions are for checking basic understanding. The answers are directly stated in the text, making them perfect for younger readers or as a warm-up activity.

- **Where did Grace first get the idea that there has never been a female president?** (Answer: She was looking at a wall of presidential portraits at her school.)
- **What is the name of the boy who runs against Grace?** (Answer: Thomas Cobb.)
- **What special job does Principal Mitchell assign to the two candidates?** (Answer: He tasks them with meeting with the delegates from each state.)
- **How does Grace win delegates from states like California and Texas?** (Answer: She listens to their concerns, such as drought in California and the need for new computers in Texas, and promises to help.)
- **What is the final vote count between Grace and Thomas?** (Answer: It comes down to a tie, forcing the

deciding vote to come from the smallest state, which Grace wins.)

Inferential Comprehension Questions (Reading Between the Lines)

Inferential questions require students to use clues from the text combined with their own background knowledge to form conclusions. They are excellent for developing deeper reading skills. These **Grace for President comprehension questions** encourage students to become detectives.

- **Why do you think Grace felt so strongly about running for president after seeing the portraits?** (Inference: She likely felt a sense of injustice and realized she, as a girl, was not represented. She wanted to make history and be a part of that group.)
- **Why did Thomas win the male vote so easily at the beginning?** (Inference: The story suggests some students voted for Thomas simply because he was a boy, showing early gender bias. Thomas also relied on popularity and sports analogies.)
- **What does Grace's mother mean when she says, "You can't just talk about what you want, you have to show people why you care"?** (Inference: She means

that good leaders must demonstrate empathy and action. Words are not enough; you have to prove your dedication through deeds.)

- **Why do you think the author included the detail about Thomas being a good sport at the end?** (Inference: To show that a good election is not about winning or losing, but about competing honorably. It teaches that opponents can be friends and that democracy works best when everyone respects the process.)

Evaluative and Opinion-Based Questions (Critical Judgment)

These questions ask students to make a judgment, form an opinion, and back it up with evidence. They often have no single "correct" answer, which makes them great for classroom discussion. Using **Grace for President comprehension questions** in this category sparks rich conversation.

- **Who do you think would have made a better president: Grace or Thomas? Why?** (Expected reasoning: Students might argue for Grace because she listened to specific problems, or for Thomas because he was very organized and popular.)
- **Do you think the electoral college system used in the**

book is fair? Why or why not? (Discussion point: Students can debate whether the “winner-take-all” system of delegates is fair to all voters.)

USING QUESTIONS FOR DIFFERENT AGE GROUPS

For Early Readers (K-1)

Sample Grace for President comprehension questions for grades 2-3:

- If you were a delegate from Kansas, who would you vote for and why?

CREATING A COMPLETE LESSON PLAN WITH GRACE

Host a Classroom Election

Explore Other Biographies of Female Leaders

Pair this book with non-fiction titles about women who ran for president, such as Hillary Clinton or Shirley Chisholm. Compare the real-life challenges with those faced by Grace. This connection between fiction and reality deepens the impact of the **Grace for President comprehension questions** regarding gender equality.

Write a Letter to a Delegate

FOR PRESIDENT

To effectively integrate these questions, structure your lesson in three parts: Before, During, and After reading. This ensures students are engaged with the material holistically.

Before Reading Hook

Start by asking a broad question like, “What makes a good leader?” or “Do you think it is harder for a girl or a boy to become president today?” This activates prior knowledge and prepares students for the themes of the book.

During Reading Check-Ins

Pause after key events, such as the revelation of the presidential portraits or the first meeting of the students. Ask a quick literal question to ensure everyone is following the plot. For example, “Who was the first person to announce their candidacy?”

After Reading Reflection

This is where the majority of the **Grace for President comprehension questions** come into play. Use a mix of the literal, inferential, and evaluative categories. You can use a question wheel, a worksheet, or a group discussion. End with a reflective writing prompt: “If you were to run for president of your school tomorrow, what would be your slogan and why?”
